

#### University of Kentucky, Archaeologist: 1955-1967


At Kentucky Doug was a very popular lecturer and productive archaeologist. He revived Kentucky's contract program, which provided employment and theses data for graduate students.

He presented a television course about Cultural Anthropology in Lexington, which demonstrated his extraordinary teaching skills and entertainment talents.


He was also appointed director of the moribund Museum of Anthropology that soon had interesting new exhibits based on Doug's Kentucky archaeology field projects. The Museum became a "must see" stop on the UK Lexington campus for visitors and administrators.

Doug's dedication was rewarded with appointment as Academic Assistant to President John W. Oswald (1963-1964).





## Doug was Director of Museum of Anthropology and Curator in Museum. He organized this Mississippian Archaeology exhibit.












#### Doug taught a popular TV (WLEX-18) course in Cultural Anthropology in 1960


















# Excavation at Arroyo Hondo, NM (1971-1975)

In 1970 Doug decided to excavate a site close to Santa Fe. He selected Arroyo Hondo, which was just 6 miles from SAR. The site was owned by SAR and based on its size Doug knew it would be a multi-year project. Doug opened it to students to gain excavation experience and to obtain data for advanced (M.A. and Ph. D.) degree research. Initially, the project was NSF grant supported from 1971 to 1975. However, the site was quite complex with two obvious successive occupations; it posed many questions, e.g., demographic, climatic, religious, that kept arising over time. Doug in 2014 raised private money to hold an Arroyo Hondo Advanced Seminar over a two year period to have new Southwest scholars examine the previous published Arroyo Hondo research results and prepare new research papers. These are available, along with the original reports and monographs in his eBook (Schwartz, 2016) with Doug's final appraisal of this important site.


#### Location of Arroyo Hondo Site, Santa Fe













#### Weatherhead Tour of China, 1982
















